Urban Food Forest Class: Planning, Planting and Maintaining Your Perennial Food Plants



You may have ordered perennial plants through New Leaf Foods as part of the New Leaf Food Forest project or are planning to plant perennials this year and are wondering, what now?

Join us for a virtual mini class— A Food Forest Guide: Planning, Planting and Maintaining Your Perennial Food Plants. Monday April 24, 2023: 6 pm to 7:30 pm and Monday May 15: 6 pm to 7:30 pm via Zoom.

Your teacher will be Dillon Weist, Bounty Garden Manager and Lab Assistant for the Sustainable Agriculture program at Northeast Wisconsin Technical College.

Food forests are plantings of edible landscape plants like Nanking Cherries, American Hazelnuts, American Plums, Elderberries, Juneberries, Raspberries, Blackberries, and Currants that not only enhance the beauty of any yard, but they also provide growers with yummy, healthy options that grow year after year.

Some questions you may have about the best ways to plan, plant and take care of these special food producers. You have to plan for small plants now, that will grow large over the years.

Which plants should I select?
What kind of habitat do they prefer?
How wide apart should I space the plants?
How big will they grow?
What kind of soil fertilizer might I need?
How deep do I plant?
How do I maintain and prune the plants?
What are the best options for weed control?
How long will they last?
When can I expect my first harvest?
How can I preserve the harvest?
What mistakes should I avoid?

New Leaf Urban Food Forest: Chappell Elementary— Orchard Project

We are excited to announce a new Orchard Project at Chappell Elementary School in Green Bay as part of our New Leaf Urban Food Forest Initiative.

The approximate 80 ft. x 100 ft. (8,000 sq. ft.) orchard will offer a low-income, diverse population of students at Chappell Elementary, healthy foods while learning how to be more self-sustainable. The school is already composting and has garden boxes that will continue to be used to teach sustainable agriculture.

Funding and hands on help is coming from Leadership Green Bay Cohort Team 5 to improve the quality of life in our community and meet the needs of New Leaf Foods as a nonprofit. The orchard will include 6 trees (2 apple, 2 pear, and 2 cherry), mulch for the trees, garden supplies, additional perennial flowers to promote pollinators and a commemorative plaque. If funding allows, a bench for observation will also be included.

The trees have been ordered!!! Our goal is to have the orchard planted by early summer, so look for a progress report in our May newsletter. Thank you to Leadership Green Bay and Cohort Team 5 for empowering Green Bay residents and children to grow food and contribute to a sustainable urban agricultural system.
